This course introduces experimental coding for design through hands-on technical exercises and projects. During the semester, p5.js (JavaScript library) will show the fundamentals of computational design. We will learn techniques to build generative design and digital interaction. This course is designed for students with no prior coding experience. This syllabus is a living document!

- Order of logic operations in JavaScript (conditionals and functions)
- Understanding the p5.js library by demonstrating use of effective graphical modifications

On Using External Tools (and AI)

We will constantly be checking the p5.js reference site, and we have access to the entire world wide web and all the history of p5.js. For any project, you must write a short write up of your inspiration and challenges. You must provide links to sketches, stackoverflow, and other non-p5 references you looked at. I will try and dissuade you from using ChatGPT and other code-generating software since it defeats the purpose of learning how coding works in this artistic capacity. If you do use any Al tools, you must reference how you used it (provide screenshots of your logs, provide the prompt). This includes any Al generated artwork you use as a part of your sketches.

Every assignment will have 25% of the grade for documentation and originality. This is a "do I think you wrote this code" grade, and under further scrutiny if you would be able to explain the code if I asked you to. Copying and pasting from the Internet or another student's work without attributing the source is plagiarism, whether intentional or not. While you may use AI tools like ChatGPT for feedback on how to improve your code, using any AI tools to write your assignments is strictly prohibited and will be treated as plagiarism. Anyone presenting someone else's code as their own, whether from another student, the

Internet or any AI tool generating code that is copied into your work, will receive a 0 for the assignment and will be reported to the Office of Student Conduct.
